It doesn't end in the 1960s either. In our present day, we have the BLM movements that are also based on racial discrimination.

Civil Rights Legacy

- Civil Rights Act of 1964
- Led to the <u>Voting Rights Act of</u>
 <u>1965</u>, which banned literacy testing for voting
- Also led to <u>Fair Housing Act</u>, which banned discrimination when owning property.
- Civil Rights Leader Martin Luther
 King Jr., described the Act as a
 "second emancipation"





Civil Rights Act of 1964

One of the key demands on the Civil rights movement was the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Recognized as one of the best legislative achievements of the civil rights movements, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 had ended and banned discrimination and segregation in the public towards race, color, religion, sex, and national origin. This act also led to other acts, like the **Voting Rights Act of 1965**.



Martin Luther King Jr.

Non-violent

- Believed violence was NOT the answer
- One of the most famous leaders in the civil rights movement.
- His most iconic work of the Civil
 Rights Movement was his "I Have A
 Dream" Speech

Malcolm X

- More violent
- Member of the Nation of Islam
- He was a minister and a supporter of black nationalism
- Urged Black Americans to protect themselves against white aggression "by any means necessary"
