Montgomery Bus Boycott

- Made famous by Rosa Parks's refusal to give her seat to a white man, the Montgomery bus boycott was one of the defining events of the civil rights movement.

Lunch Counter Sit-ins

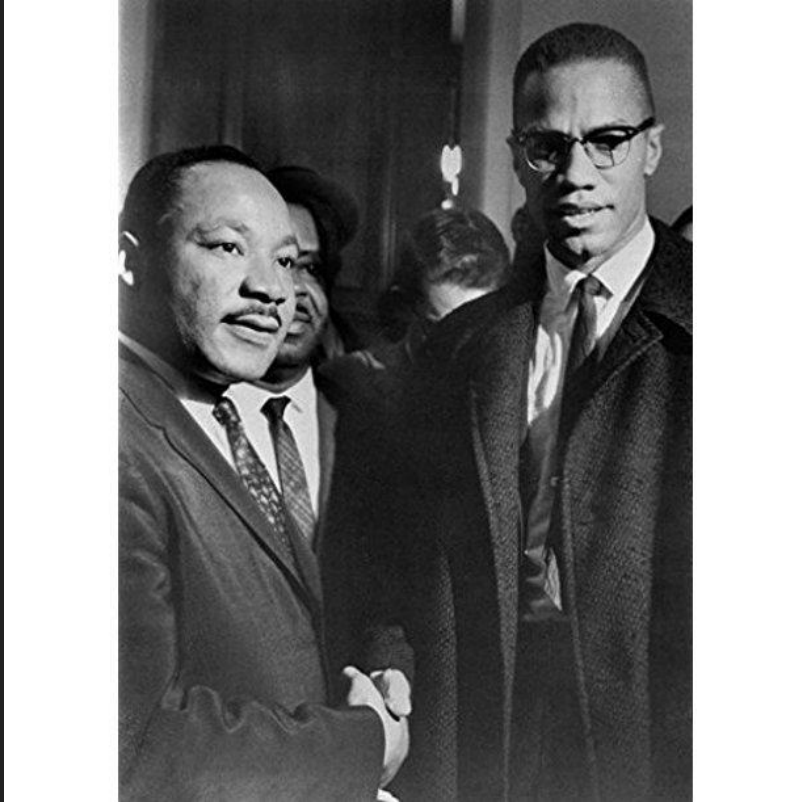
March on Washington (August 28, 1963)
